Industrial policy back on the international development agenda

The global economic crisis has led many to question the free market orthodoxy that has shaped international development policy for more than 25 years, and many governments are again considering the measures they need to take to promote industrial development. This message formed part of a presentation that was informed by EAP's work, to a recent Sustainable Development Leadership Programme organised by Cambridge University for the World Bank. Petter Matthews explained how the research EAP has undertaken jointly with the

Institution of Civil Engineers, identifies a role for public procuring entities in helping to ensure that investments in infrastructure are used to create jobs and promote enterprise development. This he suggested is consistent with recent calls for public 'policies for industrialisation' by academics and policy makers. More information on the original research outcomes is available at

African engineers call for improvements in engineering education

Engineers from throughout Africa gathered in Harare in December to discuss how engineering education can be made more relevant to national development challenges. Participants were presented with case studies of good practice and considered a range of practical strategies that universities can adopt to improve learning outcomes. This event was the latest in a series of workshops being offered by the [Africa-UK Engineering for Development Partnership](#). EAP's Director Petter Matthews, who co-facilitated the workshop with Holly Wright from the Royal Academy of Engineering, said: "Many universities are achieving good results, despite the fact that they are usually poorly resourced, but they recognise that they need to do more to support their students. We are working with our A-UK partners to see how we can support the needs that were identified during the workshop."

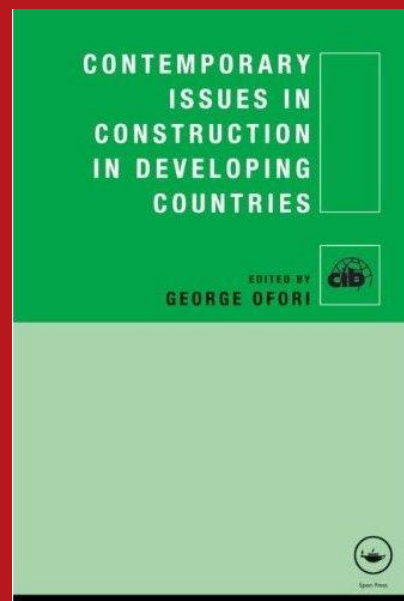
Polish NGOs sharpen their focus on infrastructure

John Hawkins, EAP Programme Manager recently delivered a two day course on delivering infrastructure projects that meet community needs to a group of Polish NGOs in Warsaw. The Zagranica Group had organised the Workshop as part of training programme that looked at effective rules for Polish NGOs to engage with their development partners. A number of Polish NGOs have been established with objective of providing small community infrastructure projects.

The workshop participants were provided with a broad knowledge of the basic requirements and a framework for creating a project plan to deliver infrastructure projects that meets the needs of the communities they are working in. They then created a project plan for delivering a health centre in South Sudan and school in Tanzania.
